




On the Binding Biases of Time

Lance Strate is Professor of Communication and Media Studies at Fordham University. He is also the Executive Director of the Institute of General Semantics. A past President of the New York State Communication Association, and one of NYSCA's Wilson Scholars, he has served as Editor of NYSCA's former journal, The Speech Communication Annual, and helped to organize NYSCA's Neil Postman Award. He is a founder of the Media Ecology Association, which he served as President for over a decade, and continues to serve on the MEA's Board of Directors, and he is a founder and past Editor of the MEA's journal, *Explorations in Media Ecology*. He is the Supervisory Editor of the Media Ecology Book Series published by Hampton Press, and is himself the author of Echoes and Reflections: On Media Ecology as a Field of Study, co-editor of several anthologies including The Legacy of McLuhan (with Edward Wachtel) and *Communication and Cyberspace* (with Ron Jacobson and Stephanie Gibson), and the author of over one

hundred articles and book chapters. He also blogs and writes poetry.





Michael Lang

The man who pulled it all together in 1969 and made Woodstock the most famous small town in the world. Lang cofounded Woodstock Ventures and is the promoter who made it all happen for the concert that doesn't-need-an-introductionanywhere-in-the-world Woodstock Music Festival of 1969. 2009 marks the 40th Anniversary of the Woodstock Music and Arts Festival that brought together amazing musicians and a generation ready for change. Lang continues to reside in Woodstock, New York and continues to promote peace, love, and music throughout the world. Mr. Lang will be joined with his co-author, Rock-n-Roll historian Holly George-Warren.

Betty Ballentine

The woman who put paperback books in the hands of millions around the world, from the nest of her handmade home in Woodstock, New York. Betty Ballentine, along with her husband Ian Ballentine, founded Bantam Books in 1945 and Ballentine Books in 1952, revolutionizing access to reading by introducing the lower cost paperback book. At one point in the late 1950s, nearly all paperback books sold around the world originated out of one of the two paperback book publishers in Woodstock. Betty Ballentine is 90 years old this year and going strong. Ballentine continues to reside in Woodstock, New York in her Handmade House.

Richard Heppner

Mr. Heppner is the official Historian for the Woodstock Historical Society, Woodstock, NY. Mr. Heppner is Author of *Remembering Woodstock* in which he pulls together a collection of essays from the Historical Society of Woodstock archives that tell the history and capture the unique spirit of Woodstock, "where the individual is always welcome and new and creative beginnings are always possible." Mr. Heppner resides in Woodstock, New York.

Barry Samuels

Manager of The Golden Notebook bookstore on Tinker Street in Woodstock. Samuels is a reservoir of historical knowledge and a staple in the Village of Woodstock for residents and tourists alike who walk into the "little" bookstore across from the Village Green. Samuels attends hundreds of house-party book releases around the area for the hundreds of writers nestled in the shadows of Overlook Mountain. If you attend a small house party book release in or around Woodstock, you'll see Barry enjoying the readings of the local writers and promoting the sale of their books, seemingly moments later Samuels is behind the counter of the bookstore known round the world. Samuels continues to reside in Woodstock, New York.

<u>68th Annual Conference</u> New York State Communication Association October 2010 Location: New York State, Specifics TBD Planners for the 68th annual conference invite conference participants to consider the question

of how, if at all, communication matters in interpersonal, digital/networked, organizational, intercultural and international communication contexts.

The word "matters" should be understood as having a dual meaning. One meaning (the more traditional one) of the proposed theme invites paper submissions, panels, demonstrations, roundtables and/or media screenings that deal with the topic of communication in its myriad conceptualizations and contextualizations.

The second meaning invites the same kinds of participation in the conference as mentioned but with an eye to exploring how, when and why communication matters in a variety of communication contexts.

For instance, Twitter. When people have the ability to tweet about the moment to moment activities of their lives...how, if at all, does this communication matter? When people are dealing with a health crisis/issue and talking with others about their situation (e.g., doctors, neighbors, friends and/or other people dealing with the same health issue/crisis)...how, if at all, does this communication matter? When "packaged" messages become *the* message...how, if at all, does this communication matter?

It is the hope that the theme of **Communication Matters (?)** will open theoretical and ideological lines of communication among conference participants to engage in discussions about how communication can effect change and is effected by it.
